

School Campus Expands

New Land for WATU Secondary School

Thanks to the enormous generosity of our major supporters, Mr and Mrs Henrik Svennas, Mr and Mrs Hannu Ryoponnen, and Mr and Mrs Conny Karlsson, together with some delicate negotiations by Josiah Mchome and Mr. Samwel Mchome over a period of several months, WATU Secondary School has been able to purchase a one and a half acre plot of fertile, irrigated land adjacent to the school campus. The importance of this land for cultivation and for teachers' housing and a sports facility cannot be over-stated.

The students have already planted a first crop of maize which is doing well. In the short term we are confident of a substantial reduction in the cost of food for the campus which, in the longer term will help us move towards a position of greater sustainability.

What a Year.....New Developments at WATU Secondary School

2015 looks as if it is going to be a significant year for WATU Secondary School. Not only have we the use of our **new piece of beautiful land** but, at last, we have **mains electricity.** Those of you who have been following progress at Shiri will know that



negotiations with TANESCO, the Tanzanian Electricity company have been ongoing for several years. However, everything is now in place and the power was turned on yesterday, which is fortunate because another important development, a broadband

internet connection, will of course need a stronger and more reliable source of power than that provided by the solar panels that we have been using for the last two years. **TIGO**, one of the large mobile and internet providers in Tanzania, have **erected**, on our land, a mast which should, all being well, provide exactly the internet access that we have been hoping for and which should greatly enhance the students' learning. Look out for more on this in the next newsletter.

School **pupil numbers are also growing.** We are very proud to welcome **26 new Form One students** and we hope that they will find WATU Secondary School to be an excellent place of learning, and a safe, caring, supportive environment. We wish them all the very best for their future years with us. This brings **the total number of students at WSS to 89 (well over one hundred with our lovely kindergarten children)**

EDITORIAL

WATU Secondary School at Shiri Mgungani is growing rapidly. We are becoming well known, mostly because of our excellent academic results and the commitment of our teachers, but also because of our wonderfully stimulating environment and our facilities which we most certainly would not have were it not for our generous supporters. A huge thank you once again. However, if we are to continue to grow to our planned final size of 150 students (ie six year grades of 25 students each) it is clear that we have to move much more closely towards a position of self-sustainability. We cannot depend for ever on the generosity of foreign donors, neither practically nor indeed ethically.

We have made one important step in making this move by purchasing an adjacent piece of land (see the article in this issue). But we have also made the important decision of inviting some Form 1 students from families who are more able to pay school fees than our students up to now have been. We realize that this move may be seen as contradicting our mandate of supporting only the financially poorest of students but we can also say that these "wealthier" students will be very much the minority. Moreover, WATU would also like to go back to a very important principle which was in our minds when we began seven years ago: providing teacher training. We believe that, with our excellent teachers we are in a position to offer workshops, discussion round tables, maybe even model lessons to other teachers and, thereby, impact an even wider number of students than we are at present and thus satisfy our mandate.
